May 1, 2022 Third Sunday of Easter



Dear Parish Family,

This weekend at the 11:30 am Mass, 31 parish children will receive their first Holy Communion, the sacred and real presence of Jesus Christ in his Body and Blood. Each year when children receive Holy Communion for the first time, these Masses make me reflect on different powerful experiences of the Eucharist — first and last Communions and the many others in between.

The following reflection was once shared with me –

We think of the little girl or boy, dressed in white, approaching the altar for their first Holy Communion. By this time, there have already been big events in their lives – birthdays; Christmas celebrations, the first day of school. But this first Holy Communion is in many ways the highpoint of their young lives. We all witness that as these children move expectantly towards the altar; their eyes transfixed on the sacred Host. With practice they receive Jesus Christ in Holy Communion. God is with these children now, in a temple innocent and pure...We think of the old woman or man who is waiting on their deathbed for their last Holy Communion. There have been big events in their lives too – wedding day; the birth of children; the first time they were called "Mom" or "Grandpa." And now with their last Holy Communion comes the climax of their final years. The priest moves near. They open their eyes as they did in their childhood, raise their white-haired head from the pillow and welcome the Savior with all of the fervor their body will allow. God is with them now and will be with them for all eternity. They receive bread from heaven, and they return there with the welcome of angels and saints.

One's first Holy Communion is always a fervent one, and so is their last. We bring to the first one the freshness of youth; we bring to the last one the clarity that age brings to life. What about all of the Communions in between? What about the countless routine trips to and from the altar? Communions missed through indifference or even sin? Does it matter? Well, of course, it matters. It matters a great deal, and I'll give you four reasons why I think so. First, in Holy Communion, Jesus nourishes us. He gives us food for our souls. In the Gospel of John, Jesus says, "If you do not eat of the flesh of the Son of man and drink his blood, you have no life in you." What soil does for a plant, what milk does for a baby, what solid food does for an adult, Holy Communion does for our soul. By receiving regularly and with fervor, we will thrive spiritually on the Body and Blood of Christ."

Secondly, in Holy Communion, Jesus makes us one with himself. We know in life people are close to each other in many ways—as family, fellow workers, friends. The most intimate human relationship we know is that of husband and wife. But the closest intimacy possible for us is the intimacy found in the Eucharist. Again, Jesus says in John, "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me, and I live in them." It isn't a question of living with another person, like in marriage, but of living in one another, sharing the same life. In Holy Communion we share the very life of Jesus. This union began at our baptism but reaches its peak in Holy Communion. And we can reach that peak of intimacy and union each time we receive Holy Communion.

Thirdly, in Holy Communion, Jesus makes us one with each other. This sacrament is not only an intimacy between ourselves individually and Jesus. It is a love affair that embraces the whole community. It is not just my personal communion with Christ; it is our shared communion with each other in Christ. As St. Paul said, "As there is one bread, so we, although there are many of us, are one single body, for we all share in the one bread." Holy Communion is a "social" sacrament, a circle that includes Christ, you and all of your brothers and sisters in the Lord. As communicants, we are not like stones scattered around a field; we are like stones in a wall, keeping each other in place and being kept in place by others. Standing before this altar, it is a sign of our love for each member of the Church, a pledge of charity towards each other that finds its source in the Eucharist.


Finally, regular reception of Holy Communion is an assurance of our resurrection. Jesus said, "Anyone who eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I shall raise that person on the last day." Our individual resurrection may seem remote to us now at this point in our lives, so remote that our mind cannot focus on it. But, as remote as it may seem, the resurrection is the one event on which we base all our hope. Death is not the supreme reality – eternal life is. We are not born for death; we are born for eternity; for resurrection. And we have it on the word of our Savior that, if we are faithful to the Eucharist, we too will rise on the day of resurrection. It is a mighty thought, a happy thought, a hopeful thought."

And so, today we pray that through this great gift of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, our parish first Communicants and all of us may be nourished, united with our Lord, united with one another and assured of our eternal resurrected home in heaven. May God increase your love and devotion for the Body and Blood of his Son.

What are the current rules for determining the age of reason for first holy Communion?

There is no hard-and-fast rule for determining the age of reason: it is a judgment call on the part of parents, pastors and teachers — the ones who know the child the best. In general, throughout the United States, second grade is the time when children receive first Communion. Typically, the children in second grade are between the ages of 7 and 9.


First Communion and confirmation are not typically given at the same time in the Latin rite of the Church, but the three sacraments of initiation (baptism, confirmation, Eucharist) are administered at the same time in the Eastern rite. For Latin-rite Catholics — about 99 percent of Catholics around the world — baptism is to be given within the first weeks of birth. First confession and first Communion follow around age 7, and confirmation may be administered at the age of reason or after. Across the United States, the typical age range for confirmation is 12 to 17, and there are good reasons advanced both for the younger and older ages.

The Code of Canon Law states: "The administration of the Most Holy Eucharist to children requires that they have sufficient knowledge and careful preparation so that they understand the mystery of Christ according to their capacity and are able to receive the body of Christ with faith and devotion.

"The Most Holy Eucharist, however, can be administered to children in danger of death if they can distinguish the body of Christ from ordinary food and receive Communion reverently.

"It is primarily the duty of parents and those who take the place of parents, as well as the duty of pastors, to take care that children who have reached the use of reason are prepared properly and, after they have made sacramental confession, are refreshed with this divine food as soon as possible. It is for the pastor to exercise vigilance so that children who have not attained the use of reason or whom he judges are not sufficiently disposed do not approach holy Communion" (Canons 913-914).



THE PROPER WAY TO RECEIVE HOLY COMMUNION

For the reception of Holy Communion, kneeling remains the universal norm of our Latin Rite. However, standing is permitted by the bishops of most places. When one receives standing, one is required to make a specific act of adoration before receiving the Sacred Host or taking the Precious Blood. In the United States, the bishops have mandated a bow of the head as the required act of adoration. A genuflection is discouraged, because of the obvious hazard to other people on line. While waiting for the person in front of you to receive recollect yourself for a moment and bow your head as a gesture of adoration. Step up when it is your turn. Receiving the Sacred Host on the tongue is the normative way of receiving Holy Communion in the Latin Rite. After saying "Amen" in response to the minister of Holy Communion, the communicant should open the mouth wide and extend the tongue far enough so that the Sacred Host can be placed upon it without danger of falling. Please note that it is important to extend the tongue, not just open the mouth.

One has the option of receiving in the hand in some places. Communion in the hand is allowed in the United States by decision of the American Bishops. If one is receiving in the hand the following is normative: upon approaching the minister of the Host extend the hands in the middle of the chest. The left hand is extended, with the right hand under the left in support (left handed persons may wish to place the left hand under the right). In essence, a throne is formed in the sign of an X-cross to receive the Sacred Host. The response of "Amen" is given to the proclamation "The Body of Christ," and the Host is received. The individual should then step to the side and receive the Host carefully and reverently. It is unseemly to "pop" the Host into the mouth as one walks away. Remember "Who" you are receiving! Please note that it is never acceptable to put out only one hand due to the danger of dropping the host. Those who do not have the easy use of both hands (or whose hands are not perfectly clean for whatever reason) should receive on the tongue. It is very important that all understand that one does not have the right to receive Holy Communion as one pleases. One may only receive in the manner dictated by Church Law. Only those practicing Catholics who are in the state of grace may receive Holy Communion. Being in the state of grace means not having knowledge of having committed any mortal sins (missing Mass on Sunday through your own fault is a violation of the Third Commandment and a mortal sin!). Those who are not in the state of grace must first be reconciled to God and the Church by means of the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession) before presenting themselves for Holy Communion.

Adults interested in becoming Catholic or learning about the Catholic faith should contact the Parish Center for information.

BAPTISMS

The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:30 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information.

Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

WEDDINGS

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

HOSPITALIZATION NOTIFICATIONS AND SICK/HOMEBOUND ARRANGEMENTS

Due to hospital admitting policies, it is necessary to inform the Parish Center when hospitalized parishioners would like a visit from Fr. Noesen or a deacon. Likewise, please call if you would like a visit while convalescing at home or at a facility.

Additionally, before being admitted to a hospital for surgery, it is advisable to call Fr. Noesen to arrange to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

Please contact the Parish Center at 630-773-1272 (ext. 200) to arrange for communion visits to the homebound.

FUNERALS

It is the responsibility of the parish to bury their dead. The funeral director will contact the Parish Center regarding arrangements. Funerals are ordinarily celebrated at 10:00 am. For more information, please read guidelines for Funeral Planning on the parish website.



If it is too difficult for you to walk to the front of the church to receive Communion, please know that at each Mass an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion comes to the back of the church to distribute Communion. If you would like to have the Extraordinary Minister give you communion in the back of church, please let an usher know

before Mass begins. At Communion time, when you see the Extraordinary Minister come to the back, please raise your hand so that they can see you and give you Holy Communion.


