From the Administrator...

IN VERITATE ET IN CARITATE

Alleluia, He is risen, Alleluia! We continue to celebrate the joy of the Resurrection as we enter the third week of the Easter season. This weekend, we hear of the encounter on the road to Emmaus, and the ultimate revelation of Jesus to these two disciples through the breaking of bread.

Luke explains that "...their eyes were prevented from recognizing Him..." as they walked along, but these two men were still willing to engage with a stranger, sharing their faith and what they did know. This was an act of faith, and a bold thing to do. Jesus had been crucified a few days earlier, and the disciples had scattered in fear of being arrested themselves and persecuted. But Cleopas and his companion were open and honest with the stranger about being disciples of Jesus, the Christ.

Jesus, out of love for their faith and devotion, walks with them and explains to them the truth of the prophecies regarding the Messiah. They must have walked at a gentle pace, so that Jesus had enough time to be able to explain all that was written. I would imagine that Isaiah alone would take up quite a bit of time, let alone all the prophets, greater and lesser alike.

Jesus was able to correct their thinking, give them new insights and let them understand the truth of the Old Testament. The coming of the Messiah wasn't about governments and armies, it is about a change of heart and thought. The message is one of love and of peace and forgiveness. And it is not for the children of Israel alone, but for all people.

For me, the most powerful moment of the story is when the disciples finally recognize that it is Jesus through the breaking of bread. The Last Supper had taken place a little over three days before, and in Luke's gospel, it seems like only the Apostles were present. But, when Jesus gave the blessing and broke the bread, Cleopas and the other disciple knew it was the Lord. Though He vanished from their sight, they were so energized, so excited, they rushed back to Jerusalem and sought out the Apostles to share the good news.

At mass, at the breaking of the bread, Jesus is again physically present before us; body, blood, soul and divinity. Do we feel the same zeal that the disciples felt? If not, why not? What is clouding our eyes, what is preventing us from truly seeing Him fully present in our midst? Do we let distractions pull our hearts and minds away from the miracle taking place before our eyes?

When we gather to celebrate the Lord's Supper, let us strive to be fully present. Through the readings and the homily, we are walking the road to Emmaus with Jesus ourselves. When we arrive at the breaking of bread, may we experience the same zeal that the disciples experienced those thousands of years ago. May we be inspired to share the good news with those we love: We have seen the Risen Lord!

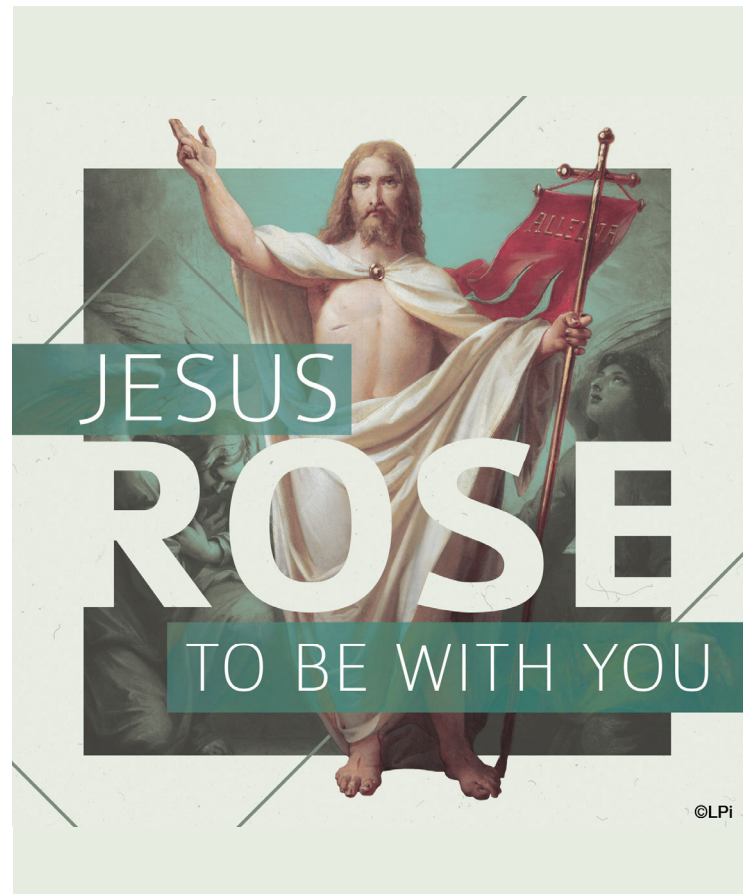
THE SEASON OF EASTER

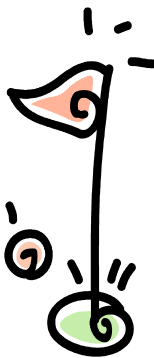

Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord

REFLECTION - GOSPEL READING:

Luke 24:13-35

Jesus appears to two disciples who are walking to Emmaus.

Background on the Gospel Reading

On most Sundays during the Easter season in Cycle A, our Gospel is taken from the Gospel of John. This week's Gospel, however, is taken from the Gospel of Luke. As in last week's Gospel, today's Gospel shows us how the first community of disciples came to believe that Jesus had risen from the dead. In these stories we gain insight into how the community of the Church came to be formed.

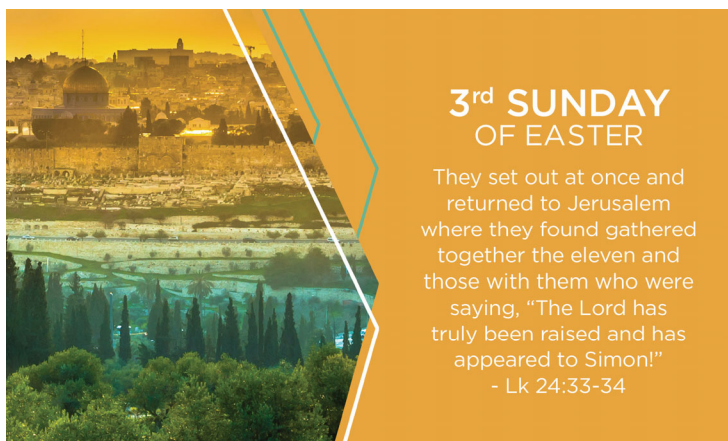
When we read today's Gospel, we may be surprised to learn that these friends of Jesus could walk and converse with him at some length yet not recognize him. Again we discover that the risen Jesus is not always easily recognized. Cleopas and the other disciple walk with a person whom they believe to be a stranger; only later do they discover that the stranger is Jesus. We learn that the first community met and recognized Jesus in the breaking of the bread, just as we meet Jesus in the Eucharist.

We can imagine the feelings of the two disciples in today's reading. They are leaving their community in Jerusalem. Their friend Jesus has been crucified. Their hope is gone. They are trying to make sense of what has occurred, so that they can put the experience behind them.

Jesus himself approaches the two men, but they take him for a stranger. Jesus asks them what they are discussing. He invites them to share their experience and interpretation of the events surrounding his crucifixion and death. When the two disciples have done so, Jesus offers his own interpretation of his crucifixion and resurrection, citing Jewish Scripture. In that encounter we find the model for our Liturgy of the Word—what we do each time we gather as a community for the Eucharist. We reflect upon our life experiences and interpret them in light of Scripture. We gather together to break open the Word of God.

In the next part of the story, we find a model for our Liturgy of the Eucharist. The disciples invite the stranger (Jesus) to stay with them. During the meal in which they share in the breaking of the bread, the disciples' eyes are opened; they recognize the stranger as Jesus. In the Eucharist too we share in the breaking of the bread and discover Jesus in our midst. Just as the disciples returned to Jerusalem to recount their experience to the other disciples, we too are sent from our Eucharistic gathering. Our experience of Jesus in the Eucharist compels us to share the story with others.

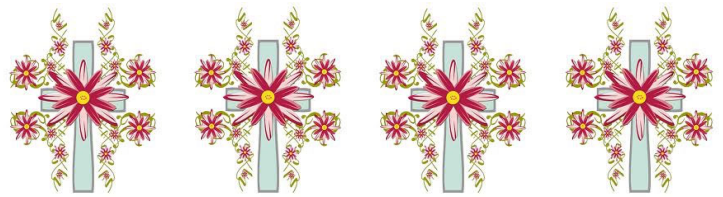
