From the Administrator...

IN VERITATE ET IN CARITATE

The time of Lent is a time of prayer, fasting and alms-giving. This week, I invite everyone to consider your prayer life, and ways to do more, especially during this Lenten season. There are as many ways to pray as we can possibly think of: private prayer, meditation, adoration, communal prayer, formal prayer, informal prayer, the Liturgy of the Mass and the Liturgy of the Hours, just to name a few.

As children of God, we should all have a desire to spend time with our Heavenly Father, sharing time with Him in prayer. One wonderful way to do this is to create a prayer spot in your home; or, as the days get warmer, a prayer spot in your yard. It should be a spot where you can have private time, one-on-one with God, to talk, share your concerns, worries and fears, and to say "Thank you" for the myriad of blessings big and small that He showers us with every day.

As family, we should also pray together every day. Whether giving thanks at table for our food by saying Grace, or gathering to pray together the Rosary or Chaplet of Divine Mercy, praying as family affirms our love for one another and brings us close. We can pray for each other and offer joint prayers for the needs of family or friends.

As a parish community, we offer a wide range of prayer opportunities throughout the year, with special extras during Lent. Every Tuesday evening, we gather to pray the Rosary together at 7:15 pm. On Thursday evenings at the Anointing Fire Catholic Ministries (AFCM) Center (the old Parish Center) there is opportunity for two hours before the Blessed Sacrament: 7:00-8:00 pm is communal prayer for vocations, and 8:00-9:00 pm is silent adoration. Every Friday during Lent, Stations of the Cross are prayed beginning at 6:30 pm. And, of course, on weekends we offer the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, the greatest of all prayers that we can offer as a community of faith.

Daily mass is offered at 8:00 am Monday through Friday. For those unable to make that time, on Fridays Deacon Anthony offers a Communion Service that begins at 6:20 am, giving you time to join in prayer, and receive the Body and Blood of Christ before starting your day. Mass is not required during the week, but is an opportunity to celebrate our faith together, and to start the day in a spiritual way.

One other special opportunity for prayer this Lent is our parish mission, which begins this weekend on Sunday at 7:00 pm. This three-night series of talks, presented by Father Tom McCarthy, O.S.A., is entitled "Our Restless Journey." If you can't attend all three evenings, I invite you to attend as many as you can. Fr. Tom is a wonderful, engaging speaker, and will help each of us make more of this year's Lenten journey. One of the last things that Father Noesen did for us as a parish was to arrange for Fr. Tom to come and share with us. I hope many of you will come to the Mission presentations for your own benefit, and in recognition of Fr. Noesen's gift to Saint Peter's.

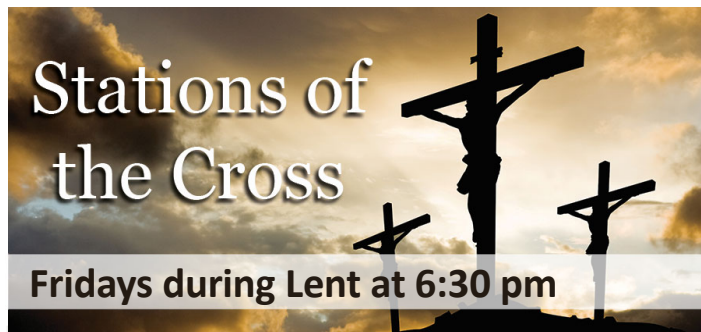

Stations of the Cross
Fridays during Lent at 6:30 pm

Stations of the Cross is a devotional service which traces Jesus' journey from the trial before Pilate to His death on Calvary. Tradition tells us that the places of visitation, the "stations," were those visited by the Blessed Virgin Mary after the resurrection of Jesus. Through the ages, people would walk from station to station trying to mirror the physical pilgrimage of going from place to place in Jerusalem. The form of the Stations of the Cross has changed over the centuries, but the devotion still carries the same meaning and is a traditional part of Lent. Bishop Hicks' Column

March 2023

Journeying 10 years
with Pope Francis



It is a common practice to give a gift made of silver for a 25th anniversary and something of gold for a 50th. However, I was wondering, what do you give for a 10th anniversary? After some research, there seems to be some consensus that either tin or aluminum is meant to commemorate a decade. Perhaps these metals make an appropriate gift since they are known for their strength and resilience.

On March 13, our Holy Father will celebrate his 10th anniversary as pope. As we have watched our pontiff lead, guide and shepherd the Church, few would argue that he has done so with great strength and resilience. I am truly amazed by his vigor, perseverance and tenacity. Sometimes I wonder if I reach his age, God willing, will I still have that type of energy?

Pope Francis, like his predecessors, is so much more than a CEO of a worldwide organization. He is the apostolic successor to St. Peter, the "rock" upon which the Church is built. Just like the apostle, he has his own personality. Some people focus on his warm smile or infectious laugh, while others notice his ability to listen and engage in conversation. Even the name he chose as pope, Francis after St. Francis of Assisi, is a nod to his humility.

I am a bishop ordained under Pope Francis in 2018 and then installed in 2020 for the Diocese of Joliet. I have tried to emulate his famous advice that a bishop and priest should strive to be a good shepherd with "the smell of the sheep." In other words, the Church is better off with leaders who spend time among the people of God. Pope Francis continues to give us an example of how to be and do just that.

I have a beautifully framed photo of Pope Francis, Cardinal Cupich and myself taken in Rome in December 2019 during an ad limina meeting. I love the photo because we are all laughing out loud. This snapshot was captured when Cardinal Cupich, one by one, was introducing the 26 bishops from Illinois, Indiana and Wisconsin to the Holy Father. While introducing the bishop standing in front of me, Cardinal Cupich said to the pope, "He is one of my retired bishops." The pope looked at him and said, "You look much too young to be retired." Then it was my turn. The pope firmly took my hand to shake it, and Cardinal Cupich said to him, "And this is Bishop Ron Hicks. He is my vicar general."

The pope then broke into a big smile, looked at me and said, "You are a vicar general and a bishop? You look like you are still in high school!" It was a beautiful moment to share in that laughter and joy, and I am glad it was immortalized in a photo, which I treasure.

No matter how you describe Pope Francis, his 10th anniversary gives us a wonderful opportunity to thank him for his faith, leadership and prayers. That's in addition to all of the work he has accomplished, which includes three encyclicals, four synods, countless homilies, extensive travel, innumerable audiences and the canonization of more than 900 new saints, chief among which are Pope John Paul II, Pope John XXIII, Mother Teresa of Kolkata, Pope Paul VI and Oscar Romero, along with the 813 martyrs of Otranto.

He has also given us several exhortations over these 10 years, from which there are many things to learn and ponder. His first such document in 2013 was "Evangelii Gaudium" (The Joy of the Gospel), and I appreciate that he began his pontificate proclaiming, "joy" – namely the joy that comes from an encounter with the risen Lord, Jesus. The joy of the Gospel fills our hearts and lives because of the salvation brought through Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection, which sets us free from sin, sorrow, inner emptiness and loneliness.

As I write this, I realize it would take volumes to capture what the pope has done and accomplished over 10 years. And even though his achievements are vast, I cannot help but think of all of the pressure he endures and the burdens he carries daily. Leading the Church amid today's complexities, polarization and challenges is not easy. Therefore, I thank God that our pope wakes up each day and leads with gospel joy, faith and zeal.

Every day at Masses across the globe, we as a Church rightfully unite our voices in the Eucharistic Prayer as we ask God to "be pleased to confirm in faith and charity your pilgrim Church on earth, with your servant, Francis, our Pope." As we celebrate the 10th anniversary of our Holy Father, let us in a special way pray for his continued strength and resilience, as together we wish Pope Francis, "Ad multos Annos!"

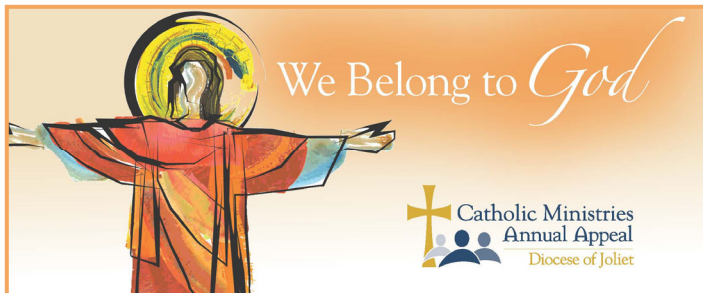

Dear Parishioners:

On February 15th, the parish was notified that JS Paluch, our long-time bulletin publisher, would be going out of business, and that effective with the March 5th bulletin, the parish would need to secure other means for publishing. Needless to say, with such short notice, it has been a bit of a scramble to determine the next steps. In investigating alternative options, it became clear that the bulletin would need to skim down to 8 pages and that the quantity printed would also need to be reduced. Until this time, the parish has not incurred any expense for printing the bulletins, as it was subsidized by advertiser revenue. In looking back at the past year or more, it is evident that advertiser support dropped significantly; as such, in exploring alternative bulletin print vendors, it became clear that other publishers cannot offer the same benefit.

Although the parish has not received any funds from JS Paluch for current bulletin advertisers, at this time we are honoring these ads for the interim. Naturally, the parish would like to once again build an advertising revenue that will sustain the publication of the bulletin.
