Dear Parish family,

For the last five Sundays, we have listened to the "Bread of Life" discourse from St. John's Gospel. We now return to the Gospel according to St. Mark. Today's Gospel contains Jesus' condemnation of the Pharisees for their hypocrisy. Generally, the Gospels do not speak well of the Pharisees; even the very word has become a synonym for "hypocrite."

"The Pharisees were, for the most part, fine people. They were deeply concerned about avoiding sin and keeping God's commandments. They believed that the Torah was the ultimate Word of God, and they distinguished 613 precepts in the Torah for their fellow Jews to follow. The problem that Jesus had with some of them, specifically the ones that were trying to condemn him, was that they not only believed in the written Torah. In addition, they also believed that their interpretations were equally binding as the written Torah. Thus, their religion often became a meticulous observance of innumerable precepts and interpretations often void of the real meaning of God's Word. Their personal interpretations burdened their fellow Jews and compromised the Torah's very purpose, which was to liberate. This is what Jesus means when he speaks of their "human traditions" which have distorted the Torah.


"The Gospel speaks directly to those of us who are in fact serious about the requirements of religious observance. For us, the Pharisees serve as clear examples of the grave danger of careful but superficial observance. We may be scrupulously concerned with all kinds of pious practices, some indeed of our own devising. But at the same time we may be seriously lacking in compassion and forgiveness. We may very well be, like the Pharisees, self-righteous and judgmental. Such a situation provides us with the illusion of virtue but it is in fact far removed from the deep personal conversion preached by Jesus." (Source: A Practical Commentary on Holy Scripture)

In our Gospel, today Jesus reminds us that what makes us unclean or what makes us sinners is not what we eat, not what enters our mouth, but rather it is what comes from our hearts. Jesus teaches, "Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but the things that come out from within are what defile. From within our hearts, comes evil thoughts of lack of charity and chastity, theft, murder, adultery, greed, malice, deceit, licentiousness, envy, blasphemy, arrogance, and folly. All these evils come from within and they defile." Without the closeness of Christ, evil can grow within us.

Today, we find ourselves in the midst of evil. There is so much corruption in our land from our local surroundings all the way up to the highest level in government. If we want to struggle against evil, we need Christ so that He may help us root out the evil within us. As Catholics, we have the beautiful Sacrament of Reconciliation. Always seek personal conversion and the sacramental grace that comes from this gift of forgiveness and purity. May we seek to serve God with sincerity and humility recognizing that we are sinners in need of redemption.

REVISED Guidelines for Mass Attendance and Parish Activities (as of August 19, 2021)

REVISED COVID-19 Protocols

The progress of the COVID-19 pandemic in Illinois remains unpredictable. The Diocese of Joliet continues to consult with public health, education, and civil authorities and modify requirements as conditions, mandates, and guidance change. We are committed to providing an integrated, safe, responsible, and balanced perspective. Faithful citizenship is key. We expect individuals to take personal responsibility for the common good, and their own safety. Remember that taking every precaution to reduce the spread of the virus is an act of charity toward others in Christ, particularly toward the sick, the elderly, and those too young to receive vaccine protection.

- We encourage everyone to get vaccinated.
- WEARING A MASK is STRONGLY recommended for everyone vaccinated or not while INSIDE the church and parish facilities.
- Masks are required for everyone participating in religious education program-related activities, regardless of vaccination status.
- Continue to use hand sanitizer.
- Because Bishop Hicks has NOT yet reinstated the obligation to attend Sunday Mass, live streaming of one weekly Sunday Mass will continue until the obligation is restored.
- For those not comfortable with seating close to others, "safe seating" in every other pew is available on the
 west side of the church toward the front. Signs are in place and may not be removed.
- Congregational singing is once again NOT ALLOWED.
 Hymnals are in the pews to use if needed to read the prayers and readings.
- Once again, Holy Communion is to be received ONLY by hand. The option of Communion on the TONGUE is NOT ALLOWED until we are given permission from Bishop Hicks. This will hopefully be temporary. The priest, deacon or communion minister will direct you to receive in the hand.
- NO Holy Water will be in the fonts at the doors of the church, for the foreseeable future. Holy Water is available
 in the Baptismal Font. This water is purified and cleansed by a system built into the font.
- NO "usual" Exchange of Peace at Mass.

The "Sign of Peace" comes in the Mass when the priest says, "The Peace of the Lord be with you always" and the congregation responds, "And with your spirit." That is the "Sign of Peace." However, there has always been the option for the priest (at his discretion) to add... "Let us offer each other the Sign of Peace." Over the years, we've become accustomed to this option always being added. For the foreseeable future, we are NOT to exchange the Sign of Peace with those around us by shaking hands or making the personal contact we are accustomed to. A simple bow or wave is sufficient. Since the priest may NOT invite the exchange, please do not add it to the liturgy, since no one should add to the liturgy anything of their own accord.

As changes and revisions are made by the Government and Church leadership, we will continually keep parishioners informed, and changes will be made as the situation allows.

Our goal is to maintain a safe, responsible, cooperative, and healthy operation of the parish in these difficult times.

Catholic charity concerned for safety of Christians in Afghanistan

A Catholic charitable organization working in Afghanistan said Sunday it fears for the safety of Christians in the country, and that the group may need to suspend its activities as instability increases.

Caritas Italiana, a charity of the Italian Catholic bishops, has been present in Afghanistan since the 1990s. In a press release Aug. 15, the organization said its current focus in Afghanistan is helping vulnerable minors. "But the instability of the situation will lead to the suspension of all activities," the statement said, adding that "fears are growing about the possibility of maintaining a presence even in the future, as well as for the safety of the few Afghans of Christian belief." Caritas Italiana also said the few Catholic priests and religious in Afghanistan are also being left with no choice but to leave.

Taliban insurgents have taken over many cities in Afghanistan in the past week following the withdrawal of U.S. forces from the country. With the collapse of Afghanistan's government, Taliban fighters seized the capital city of Kabul Aug. 15, taking control of the presidential palace and declaring the war in Afghanistan to be over. The Kabul airport has reportedly been in chaos since Sunday, as Afghan men and women rushed runways in an attempt to flee the country.

The Christian community is very small in the Islamic country, where Afghan people can be ostracized or can even face violence and death for professing the Christian faith. In 2018, there were an estimated 200 Catholics in the country. There is a single Catholic Church, located in the Italian embassy in Kabul, which is operated under the Catholic mission sui juris of Afghanistan.

"The Christian community is a small but significant community which in recent years has shown attention towards the poorest and most fragile," Caritas Italiana said. The organization stated that "after a twenty-year war of incalculable human costs and billions of euros in expenditure, the withdrawal of the U.S. military is leaving the country in a tragic void." "As always, the weakest will pay the highest price, already in the tens of thousands fleeing the combat zones, while the Taliban are now in the capital, Kabul." "Together with the staff of the embassies, even the very few priests, men and women religious who are in Kabul are preparing for their forced return," the charity said.

Pope Francis asked for prayers for the people of Afghanistan after praying the Angelus, a traditional Marian prayer, on Sunday.

"I ask all of you to pray with me to the God of peace so that the clamor of weapons might cease and solutions can be found at the table of dialogue," he said. "Only thus can the battered population of that country – men, women, elderly and children – return to their own homes, and live in peace and security, in total mutual respect."

Caritas Italiana said it is assessing the situation of Afghan refugees in Pakistan at the Afghanistan border. "In these hours, a growing mass of refugees are fleeing the war zones, increasing the pressure in the direction of the surrounding countries," it said. "Even Western countries will find themselves facing increasing pressure from people fleeing this country." The Italian charity said in the 2000s it supported a large program of emergency aid, rehabilitation, and development in Afghanistan, including the construction of four schools and 100 houses, and the return of 483 refugee families to the Panshir valley.

U.S. Catholics urged to give to efforts helping Haitians recover from quake 08/23/2021

WASHINGTON (CNS) — The president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops has asked bishops across the country to take up a voluntary collection to help Haiti recover from a recent pair of natural disasters.

Saying that Haitians are likely to experience continuing hardships from an Aug. 14 earthquake and a tropical storm that swept through the ravaged southwestern part of the country days later, Archbishop José H. Gomez of Los Angeles made the request in a letter to bishops.

The magnitude 7.2 earthquake devastated communities in southwestern Haiti. Nearly 2,200 people died, more than 12,000 were injured and hundreds more were missing Aug. 20.

Money collected will be funneled to the Bishops Emergency Disaster Fund and will be used to support the pastoral and reconstruction needs of the Haitian Catholic Church as well as efforts of Catholic Relief Services and possibly Catholic Charities USA.

The USCCB said in a news release Aug. 20 that if the money collected cannot be distributed in Haiti, funding will be used for other emergency relief where it is needed most as determined by the bishops' Committee on National Collections.

Archbishop Gomez acknowledged in the letter that many U.S. dioceses continue to feel the financial pinch of the COVID-19 pandemic, but recognized that parishioners are generous and harbor deep care for people in need around the globe.

In addition, the bishops' Subcommittee on the Church in Latin America has approved \$10,000 grants to three dioceses in Haiti that have been most heavily affected by the disaster.

Workers with CRS, the U.S. bishops overseas and relief agency, continue to distribute humanitarian aid in the affected region.

In the Diocese of Brooklyn, New York, Bishop Nicholas DiMarzio has asked all parishes through the New York boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens to schedule a special voluntary collection for victims of the earthquake during the next two weekends.

"We have all seen the painful images of devastation and heard of the deaths caused by the most recent earthquake in Haiti," Bishop DiMarzio said Aug. 19. "Our heartfelt prayers go out to all those affected by this terrible disaster. I ask the Lord to extend His blessings upon our brothers and sisters in Haiti during this difficult time."

The funds raised in the special collection at parishes will be sent by the diocese for distribution and direct assistance to those who have been affected, the diocese said. The CEO of the Knights of Columbus, Patrick Kelly, announced that his organization has made an initial commitment of \$250,00 to assist those suffering on the island nation.

"Our prayers are with our neighbors in Haiti as they recover from yet another tragedy and seek once again to rebuild," Supreme Knight Kelly said Aug. 19. "Just as we reached out to provide aid following the 2010 earthquake, the Knights of Columbus will again reach out in charity to help our neighbors in need in Haiti."

After the 2010 earthquake, the Knights became active in Haiti, providing over \$1 million in financial assistance to Haitians in need, in particular to help restore mobility to those injured in the quake.

Through its partnership with the Global Wheelchair Mission, the Knights of Columbus has delivered more than 1,000 wheelchairs to Haiti. In collaboration with Project Medishare, the Knights contributed major financial support for a sustainable prosthetics and rehabilitation program in Haiti and helped to create the Emilio B. Moure Clinic for Hope in Port-au-Prince.

The clinic, named for the Knights' late supreme secretary, houses materials and equipment, and it serves as a classroom for training Haitians who are eligible to be hired as prosthetic technicians.

"The Knights of Columbus is a fraternal organization with a deep sense of brotherhood among our members," Kelly said. "In keeping with the mission of our founder, Blessed Michael McGivney, we are also deeply committed to a charity which sees all humanity as brothers and sisters."


Special collection for Haiti recovery efforts Weekend of September 11-12

The people of Haiti have suffered greatly in recent days, as both an earthquake and tropical storm have struck the country located in the Caribbean Sea. Numerous lives have been lost, and many Church properties, along with homes and businesses, have been severely damaged or destroyed.

Catholic Relief Services is on the ground providing humanitarian aid, and the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Subcommittee on the Church in Latin America has approved \$10,000 grants to each of the three most affected dioceses. But more help is needed.

In his role as USCCB president, Archbishop Gomez of the Archdiocese of Los Angeles has called for a voluntary, special collection to support the USCCB Bishops Emergency Disaster Fund to provide additional aid to Haiti. The Diocese of Joliet has set the weekend of September 11-12 for this special collection.

SAINT GREGORY THE GREAT Pope and Doctor of The Church

Memorial: September 3

(Patron saint of teachers, popes, musicians, and singers)
Born about 540, Gregory was Prefect of Rome when he renounced the world and entered a monastery about 575. He was ordained deacon, and sent on a papal mission to Constantinople from 580-585. He became pope in 590. It was the time of the barbarian attacks on Rome; he cared for the poor and refugees, made contact with the Barbarians, sent missionaries to England. His writings are extensive, particularly the commentaries on scripture. His liturgies, collected in the Gregorian Sacramentary, have been influential to our own day. He is the Patron Saint of teachers, popes, musicians, and singers.

you guide your people with kindness and govern us with love.

By the prayers of Saint Gregory give the spirit of wisdom to those you have called to lead your Church.

May the growth of your people in holiness be the eternal joy of your shepherds.

World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation

Wednesday, September 1st

Pope Francis asks all Catholics to observe
a day of prayer for the care of creation.

In his encyclical, Laudato si', Pope Francis called us to live out an "integral ecology," which in simple terms means having right relationships with God, other human beings and the good things of the Earth. When one relationship suffers, all the others will suffer as well.


The foundational relationship in our lives is the one with God, who invites us to turn to him in daily prayer. It also reminds us that amidst the great challenges of global climate change, pollution in our local communities, and the deepening ecological and social crises all around us, we can relate to a Creator who is greater than any challenge and for whom "all things are possible" (Mt 19: 26). We can turn, then, in confidence to our Lord in prayer and ask for his grace and assistance.

In friendship with Christ, we begin to look upon creation in a renewed way. Pope Benedict XVI spoke of a certain "reciprocity" between God and our care for creation, a concept which is developed further by Pope Francis in Laudato si': as we care for the environment, we encounter God, and in this encounter we are moved to care for creation. We are reminded of the Pope's insistence on practicing what we preach (and pray), and the need for Christians to be visible witnesses of the care for creation. We are called to an "ecological conversion" (no. 217), which must be rooted in Jesus' invitation to a change in lifestyle, reverence for others and a renewed simplicity of life. These personal transformations pave the way for the work we must do together in order to address the global concerns of our day.


Finally, we would like to suggest a few tangible ways in which we can turn our prayer into witness. In Laudato si', Pope Francis reminds us of the "nobility in the duty to care for creation through little daily actions," and suggests various practical steps such as recycling, turning off unnecessary lights and using public transportation. So many of these "daily actions" occur in the context of our families and in our places of worship and work. We can begin, in these ordinary settings, to care in deeper ways for the good things God has given us. This attitude of stewardship, forged in daily life, will, in turn, allow us to participate in the greater national and international efforts to care for the Earth and for future generations.

BAPTISMS

The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:30 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information. Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

WEDDINGS

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

HOSPITALIZATION NOTIFICATIONS AND SICK/HOMEBOUND ARRANGEMENTS

Due to hospital admitting policies, it is necessary to inform the Parish Center when hospitalized parishioners would like a visit from Fr. Noesen or a deacon. Likewise, please call if you would like a visit while convalescing at home or at a facility.

Additionally, before being admitted to a hospital for surgery, it is advisable to call Fr. Noesen to arrange to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

Please contact the Parish Center at 630-773-1272 (ext. 200) to arrange for communion visits to the homebound.


FUNERALS
